

to everyone joining us today in the Cathedral Church of Christ and the Blessed Mary the Virgin, of Worcester, to welcome and install Bishop Hugh as the one hundred and fourteenth Bishop of Worcester.

The Diocese of Worcester

The service today is a celebration of the life of the Diocese over more than a thousand years, and the many ways in which our churches and schools are faithfully responding to God's goodness today. You can read more about some of our people and places in the text boxes throughout this order of service.

Our vision, as a whole diocese, is to share the good news of Jesus' love in every part of Worcestershire and Dudley, through vibrant, hospitable churches, which love God and serve their communities. We particularly want to make sure that children, young people and their families are at the heart of everything we do. We sum this vision up in the phrase 'Kingdom People'.

In order to make our Kingdom People vision a reality, our priorities are to:

- ❖ Double the number of children and young people worshipping in our churches.
- ❖ Create 100 new worshipping communities which offer creative and engaging ways for people from every background, age and context to come to faith and worship God.
- ❖ Make sure that every major population area in the Diocese has at least one 'Renewal Church' with 150 people attending weekly.
- ❖ Underpin all of this by supporting our wonderful clergy and lay leaders with training and development opportunities to help them lead their churches in a changing world.

We do all of this because the Church of England is called to be a Christian presence in every community, inviting everyone to discover God's goodness, serving them in practical ways and modelling the life that Jesus showed us.

Today's Service

Since Saxon times, English diocesan bishops have been nominated by the Crown and elected by the Cathedral Chapter (or more recently, the College of Canons of the Cathedral), before the election is confirmed by the Archbishop. In 1214 King John (buried in this Cathedral) issued a charter which codified this process. Today the Crown nominates a candidate proposed after a process of consultation and discernment including people across the Diocese. Having been thus duly nominated, elected and confirmed as our bishop, Bishop Hugh has paid homage to the King, and today we complete the process by welcoming him to his Cathedral Church and Diocese. In doing so, we celebrate all that God is doing, has been doing, and will do in this Diocese.

The new Bishop arrives and knocks for admission three times on the door of the Cathedral with his pastoral staff (crozier)—a custom deriving from the ceremony for consecrating a new church. He will be greeted by children and young people, before being led to the Dean.

Before the service, the Bishop has already taken his Oaths of Allegiance to the King and Obedience to the Archbishop. During the service he will make the Declaration of Assent, and his Oath of Fidelity to the Diocese and Cathedral will be sworn on a copy of John Wycliffe's English translation of the New Testament, a beautifully decorated 15th-century manuscript bequeathed to the Cathedral Library by John Prideaux (Bishop of Worcester 1641-1660) and traditionally used by bishops and deans of Worcester when swearing the oaths at their installations.

He will then be anointed and vested with the symbols of his office by representatives from around the Diocese, before being led into the Quire, the heart of the Cathedral's worshipping life, to complete his installation.

To be installed is to be put in one's stall or place—in this case the Bishop's Chair (the Cathedra), which is the symbol of his office as teacher and pastor. The principal church of the Diocese, the Cathedral, takes its name from this Cathedra. At one time a new bishop would have been installed by the Archbishop, or another bishop, but by long custom in the Province of Canterbury this duty has been delegated by the Archbishops to the Archdeacon of Canterbury.

After this installation, Bishop Hugh (now accompanied by the Diocesan Mace, commissioned in 1662 for Bishop John Gauden) will be formally presented to the congregation, representing the people of this Diocese, as our new Bishop, and together we will renew our commitment to the mission and ministry of God in this place. He will preach his inaugural sermon as our Bishop.

At the conclusion of the service, the Bishop of Dudley, having served as Acting Bishop of Worcester throughout the See's vacancy, will hand Bishop Hugh the Diocesan Crozier (designed by the Bromsgrove Guild for Ernest Pearce, Bishop of Worcester 1919-1930), a symbol of the Bishop's pastoral authority; and Bishop Hugh will pray for God's blessing on us here today and upon the whole Diocese.

Today's Music

The service is sung by the Cathedral Choir and Youth Choir, conducted by the Director of Music, Samuel Hudson, and the organists are the Assistant Director of Music, Nicholas Freestone, and the Organ Scholar, Benedict Braddock. Worship songs are led by a worship band drawn from St Stephen's Church, Redditch and All Saints' Church, Worcester. A special musical item will be led by iSingPOP, who create joyful collective worship experiences in primary schools and churches.

The choirs will sing three choral items in the course of the service: *Ubi caritas et amor* by Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986), *The Spirit of the Lord* by Sir Edward Elgar (1857-1934), and the *Te Deum in B flat* by Sir Charles Villiers Stanford (1852-1924).

One of four motets based upon Gregorian themes, *Ubi caritas et amor* (composed in 1960) sets an antiphon for Maundy Thursday, with the plainsong melody being heard in the alto part during the opening and closing sections. The gentle harmonic language and simple textures belie the subtlety of the treatment of the theme.

Elgar grew up next door to the Cathedral, and much of his music was premiered at the Three Choirs Festival. His oratorio *The Apostles* (1903) was the first part of an intended trilogy of biblical oratorios, of which only two were completed. The prologue, *The Spirit of the Lord*, is a solemn, impressive chorus, expansive and symphonic in scale.

The *Te Deum* is a canticle of praise and thanksgiving. Stanford's dramatic setting is part of his 1879 *Service in B flat, Op. 10*. The opening organ fanfare was added for the Coronation of Edward VII in 1902.

Historical Installations

A late thirteenth-century register describes the procedure for installing a new Bishop at that time. The Prior and Sacrist of the Cathedral Monastery met the Bishop outside the city and conducted him to the Cathedral where he was received with great honour, the bells were rung and he was led up to the High Altar. There he knelt in prayer and certain prescribed prayers were said for him. After that he pronounced a blessing and gave the kiss of peace to the monks of the Cathedral and the clergy of the Diocese. Then the Archdeacon of Canterbury installed him and he celebrated Mass. Later in the day or on the following day, he made a formal entrance to the Chapter House with his attendants and preached to the Community.

During the first three centuries after the Reformation, the Chapter, on being informed of the Bishop's arrival, received him at the north gate of the churchyard as he came across from the Old Palace. They led him into the Cathedral by the North Door and up to the High Altar where, after praying in silence, he took an oath on the Gospels to observe the statutes. The Archdeacon of Canterbury placed him in his Cathedra, and after more prayers, the Chapter escorted him back to the Palace.

Some Bishops of Worcester

Bishop Hugh will be the 114th Bishop of Worcester. His many distinguished predecessors include: St Ecgwin, who founded Evesham Abbey; St Dunstan, a statesman and reformer who spoke truth to power; St Oswald, a monastic reformer who founded the Cathedral Priory here in Worcester and many other monasteries; St Wulfstan, whose Feast Day we mark this Monday, steered the Diocese through the Norman Conquest and began the building of the current Cathedral; Hugh Latimer, who preached the Gospel and was martyred for his faith; Charles Gore, who died on this day in 1932, helped many to reconcile the challenges of biblical criticism and scientific discovery with the Church's teaching, and founded the Community of the Resurrection.



Worcester Cathedral

There has been a Cathedral on this site since 680; St Wulfstan began the present building in 1084. When the monastery was dissolved in 1540, some of the last monks became the first Dean and Chapter.

Prayer is offered here, morning and evening, every day of the year. We pray for the people of the Diocese of Worcester, for the city, the nation and the world. Inspired by our Benedictine legacy of prayer, learning and hospitality, we welcome everyone to share our amazing heritage and learn from the wisdom of the past and the insights of the present. Having recently achieved our Silver Eco-Church Award we seek to grow further as a catalyst for environmental campaigning and awareness.



Before the Service

Before the service, a full peal of Spliced Maximus is rung on the Cathedral bells.

Bishop Hugh privately takes the Oaths of Allegiance and Obedience in the presence of the Archdeacon of Canterbury, and administered by the Provincial Registrar.

The Entrance of the Bishop

The Archdeacon of Canterbury and Bishop Hugh, led by the Head Virger of Canterbury Cathedral, arrive at the West Door.

The Bishop knocks three times for admission with his pastoral staff.

Children from Dyson Perrins Church of England Academy and St Matthias Church of England Primary School

The children welcoming Bishop Hugh are from Dyson Perrins Church of England Secondary School and St Matthias Church of England Primary School, reflecting the strong and growing partnership between the parish of Malvern Link with Cowleigh and its church schools. Through this shared life, the parish helps support pupils and staff and nurture a Christian ethos within everyday school life. Out of this partnership, a shared School Chaplain has been appointed, who offers pastoral care, contributes to collective worship assemblies, and helps build meaningful connections between school and church. As a result, many more children and families are now engaged with the life of the church.

The Presentation of the Mandate

The Archdeacon of Canterbury presents the Mandate to the Dean.

Archdeacon Mr Dean, I bring you greetings from His Grace the Lord Archbishop of York and present to you his Mandate.

Dean Mr Archdeacon, you are most welcome to this Cathedral Church, and we thank you for the greetings you bring.

The Dean hands the Mandate to the Chancellor of the Diocese.

The Declaration of Assent

Bishop Hugh, I greet you in the name of the Lord.

You have been presented to me that you may be welcomed and installed in this Cathedral Church as our Bishop.

Therefore I ask you, in the presence of God and before this congregation, to make the Declaration of Assent which you in turn will require of those to be licensed to any office within this Diocese.

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion, the Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making him known to those in your care?

Bishop

I, Hugh Edmund Nelson, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures, and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorised or allowed by Canon.

The Oath of Fidelity

Canon Professor Lynn Nichol, the Senior Non-Executive Member of the Cathedral Chapter and Chair of the Vacancy in See Committee, invites the Bishop to take the Oath of Fidelity, saying

Bishop Hugh, I ask you to promise that you will be a faithful pastor to all in this Diocese and that you will observe the Statutes of this Cathedral Church.


Following long-standing Worcester custom, the Bishop lays his right hand upon the Wycliffe New Testament to take the oath.

All Saints, Worcester

Rich Johnson is the Vicar of All Saints' Church, Worcester. It is one of two 'Resourcing Churches' in the Diocese (along with Top Church, Dudley) that are set up to share their experience, gifts and resources with other churches. All Saints and Top Church have a specific focus on planting and revitalising other churches, developing leaders and providing other resources for mission. Curates from All Saints have helped renew St Peter's Church in Bengeworth, Evesham, and St Stephen's Church in Redditch, and All Saints also supports other churches with their worship and mission. All Saints also has a ministry to youth, students, and young adults and they are seeing a quiet revival among this group.

North Worcester Churches

Sian Morgan is their Children, Youth and Families' Minister and is working with local schools and families, establishing new intergenerational church communities based around iSingPOP, as well as leading flourishing 'Mainly Music' worshipping communities for preschoolers. She recently ran the Archbishops' Young Leader Award with children at Church of the Ascension Church of England Primary School, which is based around partnership between school, church and local community.

Led by their Children and Families' worker and a team of volunteers, this takes place once a month on a Sunday at 9.30 am and welcomes families to share breakfast together and enjoy a short interactive service. This has brought more children into the Abbey's community and helped them find a church that they can wholeheartedly belong to.

Families are welcome at the weekly Praise Maze toddler service, monthly Messy Church, weekly YMCA-led youth group, annual Children's Festival, and the monthly POP-up Church in partnership with St John's Church of England Primary school, offering lively and interactive worship using the iSingPOP resources.

iSingPOP partnership

Our iSingPOP choir includes schools and parishes that have been working with iSingPOP as part of our diocesan partnership. Through songs and other resources, iSingPOP helps children discover their voice, celebrate their unique identity, and share their gifts with the world. The songs are taught in primary schools with families encouraged to get involved at a concert, often held in church. Churches across our Diocese are using the iSingPOP resources to set up new worshipping communities and after school clubs to share Jesus' love with more children and their families.



The Gospel

Please sit. London Ward, Head Chorister of the Cathedral Voluntary Choir, reads from the gospel according to Luke.

Now on that same day two of the disciples were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, and talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, 'What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?' They stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, whose name was Cleopas, answered him, 'Are you the only stranger in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have

taken place there in these days?' Jesus asked them, 'What things?' They replied, 'The things about Jesus of Nazareth, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be condemned to death and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things took place. Moreover, some women of our group astounded us. They were at the tomb early this morning, and when they did not find his body there, they came back and told us that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said; but they did not see Jesus.' Then he said to them, 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them the things about himself in all the scriptures.

As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized Jesus; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, 'The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!' Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread.


