

Solution Theme: Precious in his sight Book: Norman the Slug by Sue Hendra

Theme Introduction:

God values us very much we are all precious in his sight. We are his masterpieces; made in his image and called to live out our God-given identity as his sons and daughters. The Bible tells us time and time again that we're priceless to God, yet it's easy to lose sight of just how much we're loved. The world does not teach children or their parents that they are precious: self-worth is something lots of people struggle with.

A child with a healthy attitude about themselves and their abilities will feel capable of tackling life's challenges. A good self-image will lead to good mental health, social happiness, and academic and professional success.

D Theme exploration:

'Norman the Slug with the Silly Shell' by Sue Hendra is all about Norman who is a slug, but really wants to be a snail – if only he had a shell! Norman compares himself to others and wants to be like them. God saw all that He had made, and it was good – that includes us. God loves us just the way we are.

Poor Norman never seems to be happy with who he is. This is not how God sees us. We are precious in God's sight and He loves us just as we are.

Free play suggestion:

Link with book:

- Dressing up clothes
- A tough tray with sand/rice so that the children can create trails with their fingers or vehicles.



- I wonder who you would like to be.
- I wonder what shapes you can make in the sand/rice.

Craft ideas:

Link with book:

- Make a playdough slug, provide items that the children can put on the back of their slug to turn it into a snail. e.g. bottle tops
- Design Norman a shell. Print out the slug sheet, provide different materials that the children can stick on his back to make a shell.

I wonder what you are going to use to make the shell on Normans back.
